



Saltburn Gill

An easy flattish walk of about 2 miles (3km) occasionally muddy with steep steps at the far end. There is a charge for car-parking but there are public toilets and cafés nearby.




In 1272 a Mill was recorded at Saltburn.

Saltburn Gill is one of the best ancient woodlands in the UK; a designated Site of Special Scientific Interest. It is now managed by Tees Valley Wildlife Trust.
